From the Director

The first time I heard the story of Morgaine (Mo) and Francis (Fran) was in a car on the way to a prison. Morgaine was (and is) a theatre maker and was my assistant on an applied theatre project I was facilitating. Morgaine confided in me as a new friend; her twin sister, Fran, had been diagnosed with the mental illness Borderline Personality Disorder (BPD) several years earlier and Mo had just found out through her parents that Fran had been admitted to a hospital for over using drugs, yet again. Mo was too heartbroken to call Fran. She was drawing a hard boundary, as she so often had learned to do in the face of BPD, in order to stay sane herself. Mo turned to me and looked me deep in the eyes, "For my own sanity, I've already accepted that BPD will kill Fran. Now, I'm just waiting for the call."

Week after week, as we drove to the prison through rush-hour traffic, Mo would peel back layer after layer on the story of her life with her twin. Mo was so generous in her story telling while I asked question after question. She clearly loved her sister more than anything, but felt disconnected, angry and hurt. I was heartbroken by her stories, but curious to understand what it must be like to love your other half, your twin, through a mental illness as terrifying as BPD. From the seat next to her, I learned about Mo and Fran's parents, the twins' scary, premature birth, their childhoods, their rocky teenager years and about the tragic toll that Fran's mental illness had and was taking on their lives. On one of our last drives to the prison, Mo shared with me that she had decided to use real recordings from her family's therapy sessions (which you are about to hear) as material for a script. She wanted to write a play about her life, about Fran, about BPD. And, it was eventually Mo's script writing that actually brought Mo and Fran back into contact again after months of not speaking. And, it is the script you are about to see and hear.

This play is mostly a devised play. That means that when we started our rehearsals, only a few weeks ago, the bones of this story existed in the script but looked very different. Over the past few weeks, Mo, the incredible six cast members, and myself created the order of the text and all of the movement you are about to see. The recordings you will hear are recordings from the "real" (not actors) Mo, Fran, their parents, one of Fran's Psychiatrists, and using multiple modalities – text, voice recordings, music, dance and more.

While part of the intention of this play is to inform folks about what BPD is, and what it looks like in real life, the heart of this story is about these beautiful, complicated, very real twin sisters. It's about Mo making sense of loving her other half through a mental illness that isn't well known or understood by many and comes with a very complicated, gendered history.

I have been so incredibly lucky to work with this specific team on this delicate, complex piece of theatre. You should know that the women you are about to see on stage, and the crew behind the scenes, have given their everything to this process. They have shown up, day after day to physically and emotionally exhausting rehearsals, with their spirits and minds open and full of compassion. To Morgaine and Fran, thank you for trusting me to hold your story – it has been such an honor and your faith in me, and this process, means so much to me. To you, thank you for being here and for being willing to dive into this complicated, beautiful, hard, important piece of theatre with us.
